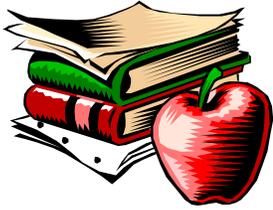

Five “D’s” (Part 4) (By: Andrew Lacroix) (Text: Jonah 4:1-4)

There are too many people in the world that are unhappy. They are unhappy with their lives, their finances, marriage, and so on. Same, sadly, is especially true for the born-again Christian. For some reason, we are miserable, not content, and downright displeased in our walk with the Lord.

Jonah might just be the most miserable prophet in the entire O.T. God has just wrought two miraculous deeds in the last two chapters and Jonah is angry? Nineveh and who knows how many countless souls are spared His impending judgment and Jonah of all people is the one who is **displeased**?

Jonah has the wrong motive in his venture to the heathen Ninevites. He was unwilling to see any non-Jewish people spared, repentant or not. I believe he cared more for the men on the boat to Tarshish more than the people of Nineveh.

Jonah revealed to God why he wanted out of this whole Nineveh call. He knew very well they would end up repenting, believing God, and God being long-suffering and merciful, would turn away His anger. Jonah wanted judgment; God was not going to punish Nineveh at this time.

Therefore, if he was not going to see destruction of others’ lives, he wanted the destruction of his own life (v. 3). This is not the first prophet who desired death. The great prophet Elijah, one of only two men not to have seen death (Enoch, Genesis 5), was fleeing from Jezebel and also requested that the Lord take him home (I Kings 19:1-7). He ended up getting the strength to continue on and was whisked away into Glory in 2 Kings 2.


Jonah needed to learn something about how merciful the Lord is, and I believe he eventually learned that lesson. But did he have a right to be angry over the fact that Nineveh was spared?

We all once in a while have desired revenge of some sort. As a (sometimes) bitter sports fan, if my team gets eliminated in the playoffs, I want the team that beat them out as soon as possible. Some of us have had tragedies in our lives and lives taken because of the sin of others. In a moment of weakness and sorrow, sometimes we will have the sin of anger. It is okay to be angry as long as we don’t sin (Psalm 4:4, 37:8; Ephesians 4:26). We can allow God to deal with any possible outcomes. Maybe the one who sinned against will get saved. There is something about Jonah here that just sees him have no desire for the Ninevites to be spared.

Are we displeased or angry about things that do not mean much to God or us? Do we have a right reason for being angry? Doest thou well to be angry? I pray not.

Five “D’s” (Part 5) (By: Andrew Lacroix) (Text: Jonah 4:5-7, 11)

So far we have looked at Jonah’s disobedience, Jonah’s deliverance, Jonah’s denouncement, and Jonah’s displeasure. I’d like us to see the last one: Jonah’s **downfall**.

God had to show Jonah something about his mercy following Jonah’s disappointment in God sparing Nineveh (3:10). He decides to show His tremendous mercy by preparing a gourd, or some sort of large area, to give Jonah some shade to rest in for a while. No doubt this part of the world gets very hot, and Jonah became overjoyed (albeit briefly) for the first time in his journey because of the relief of the gourd.

However, Jonah’s joy would not last. God prepared a worm to destroy the gourd, which He created. The worm destroys the gourd. In addition, God creates a vehement east wind. When that brutally hot sun beamed down upon His prophet, Jonah became weary, and again desired death (v.8).

First Jonah was angry over the lack of destruction. Now he was angry for the destruction of the only thing that gave him something back: a gourd that relieved him from the scorching heat.


Jonah did no work in trying to get relief from the heat soon. God had spared him from the heat just like He had spared Nineveh from His wrath. When Jonah’s relief was taken away, he felt just like how he felt after the threat of destruction of the Ninevites was taken away. He was angry over things he had absolutely no control over.

God cares for every soul. He is “not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance” (2 Peter 3:9). This is why the gospel needs to be spread. Christ commanded exactly five times to preach the gospel. Jonah succeeded in one thing: getting God’s Word to those who needed to hear it.

I believe Jonah eventually does get right. It is not recorded in Scripture, but he gets right and continues on with his ministry. The cry of Nineveh being overthrown spares Israel from their impending takeover for over a century.

As we conclude our five points on the prophet Jonah, we have learned five valuable lessons:

1. God’s Will is always best, and disobedience will do nothing but get you in a lot of trouble with God. Trials can come from disobedience.
2. Even when we are disobedient, God always has a plan for us to get us out of trouble and back into His Will and fellowship. We must show a repentant cry for deliverance.
3. Our job is to warn others of their eternal future. Jonah’s was to warn Nineveh of God’s wrath. We need to be doing the same; for judgment is sooner than many will think (Hebrews 9:27)
4. Be angry for the right reasons, and strive to never get to the point where we are displeased for the wrong reasons.
5. Don’t let circumstances control you. There are a lot of events in which we simply must trust the Lord. What we can control, ask God to help and guide you. What we cannot control, let go and let God.

He guides my falt'ring footsteps along the weary way, for well He knows the pathway will lead to endless day.


