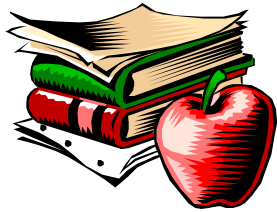

“But Daniel purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself...” Daniel 1:8

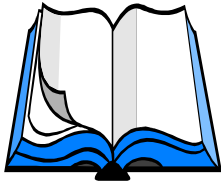
“For Ezra had prepared his heart to seek the law of the LORD, and to do it, and to teach in Israel statutes and judgments.” Ezra 7:10

Mary, Daniel, and Ezra were three very different people in different times in Scripture. Yet all three had impacted not only their own lives, but others as well by simply living their own lives right. All three dealt with their hearts while they were open and tender, just as the heart of godly king Josiah was soft and God used him in a mighty revival in Judah (2 Kings 22:19). Today I give you three heart issues we would do well to consider: pondering, purposing, and preparing. (Continued on Next Page)



Pondering, Purposing and Preparing *Continued* (By: Andrew D. Lacroix)

Let's start with Mary, the earthly mother of Christ. Mary was a very young lady when she was told she would give birth to Immanuel (Isaiah 7:14). She had quite the testimony beforehand, and continued knowing she could suffer severe attack. Back in those days, unmarried pregnant young women were frowned upon (today, thanks to godless media ventures like MTV it is sadly encouraged). Joseph, her fiancé, desired to break up their engagement but an angel told him to go through with it. A few months into her pregnancy she visited Elisabeth, the mother of John the Baptist. During her visit, praise flowed from her mouth, with such verses as "My soul doth magnify the Lord" (Luke 1:47) and, "And His mercy is on them that fear Him from generation to generation" (1:50). What a testimony this young lady had! She was set apart by God for His Honor and Glory and she pondered all of His truths in her heart. Later she may have shared these verses to the physician, Luke, who under inspiration of the Holy Spirit penned this gospel.

Next we go to the Old Testament to find a young man of God, the prophet Daniel. Daniel was but a teenager when he was captured by the Babylonians, but he surrendered to God and lived for God amongst a godless culture, led by the idolatrous Nebuchadnezzar. He had to be a testimony not only to the king and all his followers, but also to his three friends: Hanaiah, Mishael, and Azariah. Do you know these three men? (Think Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego). Belteshazzar (a Babylonian name given to Daniel) refused to eat of the king's meat, which was against the OT law of eating meat offered to gods or prohibited in the dietary laws that Moses gave to the Israelites in Leviticus 11. By him already purposing not to defile himself in this one area, the Lord would no doubt use him in other areas, whether by interpreting dreams, his praying leading to a testimony in the lions' den, or even prophesying the Seventy Weeks, Daniel and his friends were used. God gave them knowledge in all learning and wisdom (1:17) and they had an impact in the life of king Nebuchadnezzar. Another testimony to what a person can do when they purpose in their heart to honor the Lord with their life.

Barnabas was on the first missionary journey with Paul, and it was said that, "when he came, and had seen the grace of God, was glad, and exhorted them all, that with purpose of heart, they would cleave unto the Lord" (Acts 11:23). He exhorted those at Antioch to continue living for the Lord just as him and Paul were to be sent to plant other local churches. God blesses those who ponder upon His works and purpose to not obey man, but rather obey God.

God also blesses one who prepares their heart. Ezra, a scribe in the time of king Artaxerxes (over 100 years after Daniel's time in the Babylonian empire), "prepared his heart to seek the law of the Lord, and to do it..." Ezra did two very important things here: First, he sought the law of the Lord. A lot of us may seek counsel from others on things such as moves, jobs, marriage, etc., but are we really seeking the law of the Lord in these aspects? The Bible says, "Where no counsel is, the people fall; but in the multitude of counselors there is safety" (Prov. 11:14). Seek godly advice and go to the Book on all matters, whether it is easy to discern God's Will or not on the issues of your life. Not only did Ezra seek the law of the Lord, but he DID it. What good is seeking advice if you are just going to spurn it anyway? How can the Lord bless a life that reads the Word of God but does not apply it to their life? He can't! The foolish man didn't heed what he heard and he lost his house! (cf. Matthew 7:26-27) Ezra studied and did the law of the Lord, and he was able to lead a group back to Jerusalem to rebuild the temple.

Others have prepared their hearts as well. Samuel told the Israelites to put away strange gods and prepare their hearts unto the Lord, and serve Him only in order for their deliverance (I Samuel 7:3). Although Jehoshaphat was a godly king, the people were not prepared for serving Him and the high places (for pagan worship) were not removed (2 Chronicles 20:33). Isaiah warned: "Prepare ye the way of the Lord, make His paths straight" (40:3). John the Baptist quoted it urging his listeners to repent, because the Lord was coming!

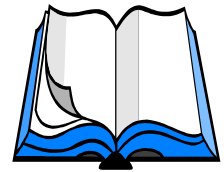
We can have success in our Christian walk by simply pondering His truths as Mary did, purpose in our hearts to not defile them with sin, and prepare our hearts to seek His Word and then do it.

Emotions in the Bible (Part 2) (By: Craig G.)

There are many verses and passages in the Bible that relate to emotions and feelings of man and our Lord Himself in trials, suffering, affliction, and of course peace and joy. The following is an ongoing study of passages that have convicted, comforted, edified, encouraged or blessed me through hearing messages, devotions and studies over the years. I hope this is a blessing and help to you and I, and that the Lord may be honored and glorified in this series of studies on emotions in the Bible. Each issue, Lord willing, will have a verse or passage in the Bible covered. I am excited and privileged to do this. Praise God! I intend to break each passage down into the following: **Passage, Emotion(s), Cause, Effect, What does the passage say?, What does the passage say to you and I?, What should you and I do about it?, How do you and I stay accountable?**



II Timothy 3:16-17

“All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works.”

Passage: Psalm 88

Emotion(s): Joy (Vs. 1a), sorrow, misery, agony, defeat, discouragement, depression, confusion and fear

Cause: Seeming broken fellowship with God (Vs. 6-8, 14-18) and obvious total separation from lover, friend and acquaintance (Vs. 8, 18)!

Effect: The psalmist is a broken, defeated, discouraged, depressed, weak (Vs. 4), lonely and miserable person overwhelmed with trials and troubles (Vs. 3).

What does the passage say? This is one of the saddest passages in the Bible. Sadly, most people overlook verse 1a! Yes, some believers will go through the trials that we read of in Psalm 88, why? Nobody but God knows, but one thing the psalmist knew in this almost life long great and grave darkness that he was in (Vs. 15), was that the Lord God is the God of his salvation! He knew he could trust in and pray to God and take all his cares and concerns to the Lord in prayer (Vs. 1-2, 9, 13). He seeks out God with questions (Vs. 10-12, 14). Though he appeared to be far from God, I believe he was very close. It is possible that satanic attack made him feel as if he was distanced from God.

What does the passage say to you and I? Why is this in the Bible? God makes no mistakes! We can trust in Him and depend on Him for all things, for He is in control! The psalmist in this passage did and though he was afflicted mightily since he was a child (Vs. 15), which shows he may have been saved as a child, he kept on trusting in the God of his salvation through it all. He did not quit! He endured hardness as a good soldier! He loved God, trusted God and prayed to God and was daily living by faith seeking His mighty hand of victory and blessing during his affliction. This affliction caused him to seek, lean on and trust God more! This man appeared to have strong faith in God in spite of his great afflictions that caused him to press on! It reminds me of a hymn I heard a few years ago that often helps me press on entitled, *“But for Calvary there go I”*. Calvary love should make all of us willing to take up our cross and die daily (1 Cor. 15:58).

What should you and I do about it? Do what the psalmist did! Pray, seek His face, trust Him fully. Walk by faith and not sight and circumstance. Someone once said, “it is better to be in the worst of circumstances in God’s will, than the best of circumstances out of God’s will.” Believer, whatever trial(s) you are facing, seek God who is more than able!

How do you and I stay accountable? Seek fellowship with God and other believers daily.

Just as I am, Thy love unknown hath broken every barrier down; Now, to be Thine, yea, Thine alone, O Lamb of God, I come, I come!

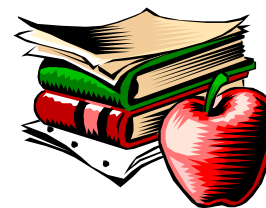
